SECTION 5 – EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and approval.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT

This First Amendment to the Agreement (the "Amendment"), by and between the Mid-America Regional Council, hereinafter referred to as "MARC", and City of Raytown, Missouri, hereinafter referred to as "Stakeholder" and is effective March 28th, 2025.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, MARC and Stakeholder are parties to an Agreement (the "Agreement") in partnership with jurisdictions in the region ("Stakeholders") to direct the United States Army Corps of Engineers ("Corps") to develop a Project Management Plan for the Little Blue River Watershed ("Project") Phase One; and implement the scope of work developed in Phase Two of the Project; and

With the goal of the Project to prepare a Chief's Report based on the findings of the Little Blue River Feasibility Study, MARC and the Stakeholder desire to amend the Agreement dated September 29th, 2022 to increase Stakeholder's contribution amount in order to complete Phase Two of the Project in accordance with need identified for Phase Two as identified in Exhibit A and contributions as identified in Exhibit B.

These article amendments are in addition to the original stakeholder agreement and do not replace the original agreement. All other provisions of the original agreement are in full force and effect.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the representations, warranties, covenants and agreements set forth in the Agreement and this Amendment, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. **Amendment.** Article I, II, and III of the Agreement are hereby amended as follows:

Article I: Raytown, Missouri AGREES:

1. To fund the additional portion of Phase 2 of the Project for an additional amount not to exceed \$20,885, for their portion of the costs. Total payment of \$20,885 is due on or before July 1, 2025.

Article II: MARC AGREES:

2. To amend the contract with the Corps with an increase of \$1,000,000 from the original budget to implement the project management plan, for a total project budget of \$4,000,000. The Corps will contribute a total of \$2,000,000 in federal funds to the project. All costs are understood to be matched 50/50 between federal and local contributions.
3. MARC will collect funds from the Stakeholder and other Stakeholders, and disperse an additional (\$500,000) in funds to the Corps.
4. MARC will retain \$60,000 to provide continued project facilitation services until the completion of the project.

Article III: Both Parties MUTUALLY AGREE:

3. Continuation of the Project is dependent on receipt of funds to MARC from

Stakeholders for the purpose of fulfilling the contract with the Corps. MARC is not liable to fulfill the contract with the Corps without available contributions from Stakeholders. In the event that funds are not sufficient, the final deliverable of a Corps Chief's Report will not be completed, and the Project will terminate.

2. **Controlling Agreement.** To the extent that the terms and conditions of this Amendment conflict with the terms and conditions of the original Agreement, this Amendment and the Agreement shall be deemed to conform with the terms and conditions of this Amendment.

3. **Binding Effect.** All of the covenants, terms and conditions set forth in this Amendment shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of all the parties hereto and their respective heirs, legal representatives, successors and assigns.

AGREEMENT

PARTIES: **City of Raytown, MO (City) and Mid-America Regional Council, (“MARC”)**

R E C I T A L S:

1. Dramatic changes in the Little Blue River’s basin conditions related to urbanization and other factors are causing increased frequency of flooding and rapid erosion that threatens the large federal investment and other significant public infrastructure, as well as the protected communities and installations. If continued unchecked, the adverse effects of the transforming watershed will cause significant deterioration to the federal flood-protection projects, increasing damage to critical infrastructure, wildlife habitat and public recreation investment. A comprehensive watershed study is required to unite the communities and agencies in the leveraging of resources for the protection of federal investment, infrastructure, habitat conservation, and storm water management allowing for increased economic benefits to the area.
2. The United States Army Corps of Engineers (“Corps”) has authorization to conduct a comprehensive Little Blue River Watershed Feasibility Study in partnership with local communities that determines the causes and potential solutions to demonstrated watershed impacts. The authorization provides for federal support for one-half of study costs. The other half of study costs will be contributed by local partners (“Stakeholders”).
3. In the first phase of this project, completed on March 31, 2022, the Corps developed a Project Management Plan, or a detailed scope of work, schedule and budget for the overall initiative. Phase One was carried out in coordination with local Stakeholders. Phase Two will implement the scope of work developed in Phase One with similar levels of stakeholder coordination, participation, and agreement.
4. The Project leverages substantial resources from a variety of Stakeholders. The following cities, counties and agencies have agreed to participate in Phase Two of the Little Blue River Feasibility Study:
 - Cities of Belton, Blue Springs, Grandview, Independence, Kansas City, Lee’s Summit and Raytown in Missouri
 - Jackson County, Missouri,
 - Mid-America Regional Council, and
 - United States Army Corps of Engineers, Kansas City District.
5. The Stakeholders requested that MARC serve as the official “Non-Federal Sponsor” to enter into an agreement with the Corps to conduct the study. MARC will coordinate and facilitate Stakeholder support, participation, and contributions to the upcoming study. Further, MARC will help assure that the Stakeholders’ needs are addressed during the study, including but not limited to the following:

- Long-term viability of federal infrastructure investments
- Reliable flood protection along the Little Blue River and its tributaries
- Stable tributary channels, riverbanks and bed elevation, and
- Natural habitat and ecosystem protection and restoration.

PURPOSE: The City of Raytown, Missouri is interested in participating in the implementation of the Project Management Plan developed during Phase One of the Little Blue River Feasibility Study (“Project”).

PROJECT COST Total project costs, along with costs for Phases One and Two are shown for all participating communities in Attachment A.

For the City, the total project cost for Phases One and Two is \$51,791. Cost for Phase Two is \$49,859.

The overall project budget of \$3,000,000 is shown in Attachment B.

- USACE – Implementation of the Project in partnership with participating communities - \$3,000,000, of which one-half will be paid with federal resources and one-half will be paid by participating communities, including \$57,011 of in-kind contributions.
- MARC – Phase Two Management, Facilitation and Administration Cost - \$70,000.

EFFECTIVE The parties mutually agree to Articles I, II, and III in accordance with this Agreement from the 1st day of September 2022 until the 29th day of September 2025. This agreement may be renewed thereafter to provide continued funding for the Project as mutually determined by the Corps and Stakeholders.

ARTICLE I

City of Raytown, Missouri AGREES:

1. To fund their portion of the Project for Phase Two for an amount not to exceed a total of \$49,859, split into two payments with the first payment of \$25,000 due on or before December 15, 2022 and the second payment of \$24,859 due on or before December 15, 2023.
2. To work with other partner agencies to identify \$57,011 of in-kind contributions to this project.
3. To provide MARC at least sixty (60) day notice of its intent to no longer participate in the Project.

ARTICLE II

MARC AGREES:

1. To provide project management and stakeholder facilitation.
2. To contract with the Corps to implement the project management plan (see Attachment C). The

- Corps will contribute \$1,475,000 in federal funds to the project in Phase Two.
3. MARC will collect funds from the city and other stakeholders, and disburse \$1,327,989 in funds to the Corps.
 4. MARC will retain \$70,000 to administer and facilitate the project.

ARTICLE III

BOTH PARTIES MUTUALLY AGREE:

1. That this Agreement and all contracts entered into under provisions of this Agreement shall be binding upon the City and MARC; and
2. That no third-party beneficiaries are intended to be created by this Agreement, nor do the parties herein authorize anyone not a party to this Agreement to maintain a suit for damages pursuant to the terms or provisions of this Agreement.

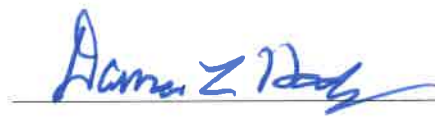
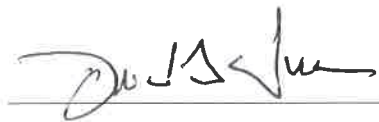

BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION

As part of accepting the Missouri Surface Transportation Program Grant (STPG), the City of Raytown must enter into an agreement with the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission to have oversight of the project. The oversight makes sure that all Federal Guidelines are met throughout the project.

The improvement contemplated by this Agreement and designated as Project STBG: 3301(538) involves: Creation of a walkable and bikeable connection between Rock Island Trail and the future park off 53rd St. The City shall be responsible for all aspects of the construction of the improvement.

The STPG is 80% of the project not to exceed \$980,000.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING A SURFACE TRANSPORTATION BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM AGREEMENT WITH THE MISSOURI HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION FOR 53rd STREET ROCK ISLAND TRAIL CONNECTION IN RAYTOWN, MISSOURI

WHEREAS, the City of Raytown ("City") desires to enter into an Agreement with the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission ("Commission") for a Surface Transportation Block Grant Program for the 53rd Street Rock Island Trail Connection in Raytown, Missouri; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the City to enter into an Agreement with the Commission, to construct certain improvements which are to be designed and constructed in compliance with this Agreement as set forth in Exhibit "A", attached hereto.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF RAYTOWN, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1 – APPROVAL OF AGREEMENT. That the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission Surface Transportation Block Grant Program Agreement for the 53rd Street Rock Island Trail Connection, by and between the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission and the City of Raytown, Missouri, in substantially the same form as attached hereto as Exhibit "A", is hereby authorized and approved.

SECTION 2 – EXECUTION OF AGREEMENT. That the City Administrator is hereby authorized to execute the Agreement, and all documents necessary to the Agreement, and the City Clerk is authorized to attest to the same.

SECTION 3 – REPEAL OF ORDINANCE IN CONFLICT. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4 – SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. The provisions of this ordinance are severable and if any provision hereof is declared invalid, unconstitutional or unenforceable, such determination shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this ordinance.

SECTION 5 – EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and approval.

**MISSOURI HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION
SURFACE TRANSPORTATION BLOCK GRANT (STBG) PROGRAM AGREEMENT**

THIS STBG AGREEMENT is entered into by the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission (hereinafter, "Commission") and the City of Raytown, Missouri (hereinafter, "City").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) Title 23 United States Code (USC) §133, authorizes a STBG Program to fund transportation related projects; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to construct certain improvements, more specifically described below, using such STBG funding; and

WHEREAS, those improvements are to be designed and constructed in compliance with the provisions of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises, and representations in this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:

(1) PURPOSE: The purpose of this Agreement is to grant the use of STBG funds to the City. The improvement contemplated by this Agreement and designated as Project STBG: 3301(538) involves:

Create a walkable and bikeable connection between Rock Island Trail and future park off 53rd St.

The City shall be responsible for all aspects of the construction of the improvement.

(2) LOCATION: The contemplated improvement designated as Project STBG:3301(538) by the Commission is within the city limits of Raytown Missouri. The general location of the improvement is shown on an attachment hereto marked "Exhibit

A" and incorporated herein by reference. More specific descriptions are as follows:
Rock Island Trail Connection on 53rd St. in Raytown, MO.

(3) REASONABLE PROGRESS POLICY: The project as described in this agreement is subject to the reasonable progress policy set forth in the Local Public Agency (LPA) Manual [and the final deadline specified in Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. In the event, the LPA Manual and the final deadline within Exhibit B conflict, the final deadline within Exhibit B controls]. If the project is within a Transportation Management Area that has a reasonable progress policy in place, the project is subject to that policy. If the project is withdrawn for not meeting reasonable progress, the City agrees to repay the Commission for any progress payments made to the City for the project and agrees that the Commission may deduct progress payments made to the City from future payments to the City.

(4) LIMITS OF SYSTEM: The limits of the surface transportation system for the City shall correspond to its geographical area as encompassed by the urban boundaries of the City as fixed cooperatively by the parties subject to approval by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA).

(5) ROUTES TO BE INCLUDED: The City shall select the high traffic volume arterial and collector routes to be included in the surface transportation system, to be concurred with by the Commission, subject to approval by the FHWA. It is understood by the parties that surface transportation system projects will be limited to the said surface transportation system, but that streets and arterial routes may be added to the surface transportation system, including transfers from other federal aid systems.

(6) INVENTORY AND INSPECTION: The City shall:

(A) Furnish annually, upon request from the Commission or FHWA, information concerning conditions on streets included in the STBG system under local jurisdiction indicating miles of system by pavement width, surface type, number of lanes, and traffic volume category.

(B) Inspect and provide inventories of all bridges on that portion of the federal-aid highway systems under the jurisdiction of the City in accordance with the Federal Special Bridge Program, as set forth in 23 USC §144, and applicable amendments or regulations promulgated thereunder.

(7) CITY TO MAINTAIN: Upon completion of construction of this improvement, the City shall accept maintenance of the improvements made by this project at no cost and expense whatsoever to the Commission. Any traffic signals installed on highways maintained by the Commission will be turned over to the Commission upon completion of the project for operational maintenance. Any aesthetic improvements installed on highways maintained by the Commission upon completion of the project will be the sole responsibility of the City for maintenance. All obligations of the Commission under this Agreement shall cease upon completion of the improvement.

(8) INDEMNIFICATION: To the extent allowed or imposed by law, the City shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Commission, including its members and the Missouri Department of Transportation ("MoDOT" or "Department") employees, from any claim or liability whether based on a claim for damages to real or personal property or to a person for any matter relating to or arising out of the City's wrongful or negligent performance of its obligations under this Agreement.

(9) INSURANCE:

(A) The City is required or will require any contractor procured by the City to work under this Agreement:

1. To obtain a no cost permit from the Commission's district engineer prior to working on the Commission's right of way, which shall be signed by an authorized contractor representative (a permit from the Commission's district engineer will not be required for work outside of the Commission's right of way); and

2. To carry commercial general liability insurance and commercial automobile liability insurance from a company authorized to issue insurance in Missouri, and to name the Commission, and the MoDOT and its employees, as additional insureds in amounts sufficient to cover the sovereign immunity limits for Missouri public entities (\$600,000 per claimant and \$4,000,000 per occurrence) as calculated by the Missouri Department of Insurance, Financial Institutions and Professional Registration, and published annually in the Missouri Register pursuant to section 537.610 RSMo.

(B) In no event shall the language of this Agreement constitute or be construed as a waiver or limitation for either party's rights or defenses with regard to each party's applicable sovereign, governmental, or official immunities and protections as provided by federal and state constitution or law.

(10) CONSTRUCTION SPECIFICATIONS: Parties agree that all construction under the STBG for the City will be constructed in accordance with current MoDOT design criteria/specifications for urban construction unless separate standards for the surface transportation system have been established by the City and the Commission subject to the approval of the FHWA.

(11) FEDERAL-AID PROVISIONS: Because responsibility for the performance of all functions or work contemplated as part of this project is assumed by the City, and the City may elect to construct part of the improvement contemplated by this Agreement with its own forces, a copy of Section II and Section III, as contained in the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) Form Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) 1273 "Required Contract Provisions, Federal-Aid Construction Contracts," is attached and made a part of this Agreement as Exhibit C. Wherever the term "the contractor" or words of similar import appear in these sections, the term "the City" is to be substituted.

The City agrees to abide by and carry out the condition and obligations of "the contractor" as stated in Section II, Equal Opportunity, and Section III, Nonsegregated Facilities, as set out in Form FHWA 1273.

(12) ACQUISITION OF RIGHT OF WAY: With respect to the acquisition of right of way necessary for the completion of the project, City shall acquire any additional necessary right of way required for the project and in doing so agrees that it will comply with all applicable federal laws, rules, and regulations, including 42 USC 4601-4655, the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act, as amended and any regulations promulgated in connection with the Act. However, upon written request by the City and the written acceptance by the Commission, the Commission shall acquire right of way for the City. Upon approval of all agreements, plans and specifications by the Commission and the FHWA, the commission will file copies of said plans in the office of the county clerk: and proceed to acquire by negotiation and purchase or by condemnation any necessary right of way required for the construction of the improvement contemplated herein. All right of way acquired by negotiation and purchase will be acquired in the name of City, and the City will pay to grantors thereof the agreed upon purchase prices. All right of way acquired through condemnation proceedings will be acquired in the name of the State of Missouri and subsequently released to the City. The City shall pay into court all awards and final judgments in favor of any such condemnees. The City shall also reimburse the Commission for any expense incurred by the Commission in acquiring said right of way, including but not limited to the costs of surveying, appraisal, negotiation, condemnation, and relocation assistance benefits. Unless otherwise agreed to in writing the Commission shall have the final decision regarding the settlement amount in condemnation.

(13) REIMBURSEMENT: The cost of the contemplated improvements will be borne by the United States Government and by the City as follows:

(A) Any federal funds for project activities shall only be available for reimbursement of eligible costs which have been incurred by City. Any costs incurred by City prior to authorization from FHWA and notification to proceed from the Commission are **not** reimbursable costs. All federally funded projects are required to have a project end date. Any costs incurred after the project end date are not eligible for reimbursement. The federal share for this project will be 80% (eighty percent) not to exceed \$980,000 (nine hundred eighty thousand dollars). The calculated federal share for seeking federal reimbursement of participating costs for the herein improvements will be determined by dividing the total federal funds applied to the project by the total participating costs. Any costs for the herein improvements which exceed any federal reimbursement or are not eligible for federal reimbursement shall be the sole responsibility of City. The Commission shall not be responsible for any costs associated with the herein improvement unless specifically identified in this Agreement or subsequent written amendments.

(B) The total reimbursement otherwise payable to the City under this Agreement is subject to reduction, offset, levy, judgment, collection or withholding, if there is a reduction in the available federal funding, or to satisfy other obligations of the City to

the Commission, the State of Missouri, the United States, or another entity acting pursuant to a lawful court order, which City obligations or liability are created by law, judicial action, or by pledge, contract or other enforceable instrument. Any costs incurred by the City prior to authorization from FHWA and notification to proceed from the Commission are not reimbursable costs.

(14) PERMITS: The City shall secure any necessary approvals or permits from the Federal Government and the State of Missouri as required to permit the construction and maintenance of the contemplated improvements.

(15) TRAFFIC CONTROL: The plans shall provide for handling traffic with signs, signal and marking in accordance with the Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD).

(16) WORK ON STATE RIGHT OF WAY: If any contemplated improvements for Project STBG:3301(538) will involve work on the state's right of way, the City will provide reproducible final plans to the Commission relating to such work.

(17) DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES (DBEs): At time of processing the required project agreements with the FHWA, the Commission will advise the City of any required goals for participation by DBEs to be included in the (City's/County's/Grantee's) proposal for the work to be performed. The City shall submit for Commission approval a DBE goal or plan. The City shall comply with the plan or goal that is approved by the Commission and all requirements of Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 26, as amended.

(18) NOTICE TO BIDDERS: The City shall notify the prospective bidders that DBEs shall be afforded full and affirmative opportunity to submit bids in response to the invitation and will not be discriminated against on grounds of race, color, sex, or national origin in consideration for an award.

(19) PROGRESS PAYMENTS: The City may request progress payments be made for the herein improvements as work progresses but not more than once every two (2) weeks. Progress payments must be submitted monthly. All progress payment requests must be submitted for reimbursement within ninety (90) days of the project completion date for the final phase of work. The City shall repay any progress payments which involve ineligible costs.

(20) PROMPT PAYMENTS: Progress invoices submitted to MoDOT for reimbursement more than thirty (30) calendar days after the date of the vendor invoice shall also include documentation that the vendor was paid in full for the work identified in the progress invoice. Examples of proof of payment may include a letter or e-mail from the vendor, lien waiver or copies of cancelled checks. Reimbursement will not be made on these submittals until proof of payment is provided. Progress invoices submitted to MoDOT for reimbursement within thirty (30) calendar days of the date on the vendor invoice will be processed for reimbursement without proof of payment to the vendor. If the

City has not paid the vendor prior to receiving reimbursement, the City must pay the vendor within two (2) business days of receipt of funds from MoDOT.

(21) OUTDOOR ADVERTISING: The City further agrees that the right of way provided for any STBG improvement will be held and maintained inviolate for public highway or street purposes, and will enact and enforce any ordinances or regulations necessary to prohibit the presence of billboards or other advertising signs or devices and the vending or sale of merchandise on such right of way, and will remove or cause to be removed from such right of way any sign, private installation of any nature, or any privately owned object or thing which may interfere with the free flow of traffic or impair the full use and safety of the highway or street.

(22) FINAL AUDIT: The Commission will perform a final audit of project costs. The United States Government shall reimburse the City, through the Commission, any monies due. The City shall refund any overpayments as determined by the final audit.

(23) AUDIT REQUIREMENTS: If the City expend(s) one million dollars (\$1,000,000) or more in a year in federal financial assistance it is required to have an independent annual audit conducted in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200. A copy of the audit report shall be submitted to MoDOT within the earlier of thirty (30) days after receipt of the auditor's report(s), or nine (9) months after the end of the audit period. Subject to the requirements of 2 CFR Part 200, if the City expend(s) less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) a year, the City may be exempt from auditing requirements for that year but records must be available for review or audit by applicable state and federal authorities.

(24) FEDERAL FUNDING ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY ACT (FFATA) OF 2006: The City shall comply with all reporting requirements of the FFATA of 2006, as amended. This Agreement is subject to the award terms within 2 CFR Part 170.

(25) VENUE: It is agreed by the parties that any action at law, suit in equity, or other judicial proceeding to enforce or construe this Agreement, or regarding its alleged breach, shall be instituted only in the Circuit Court of Cole County, Missouri.

(26) APPLICABLE LAWS AND REGULATIONS: This Agreement shall be construed according to the laws of the State of Missouri. Each party shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and ordinances. Additionally, each party shall adhere to all accepted industry standards, processes, and procedures relevant to the performance of their obligations under this Agreement. A violation of this paragraph constitutes a material breach of the Agreement.

(27) AMENDMENTS: Any change in this Agreement, whether by modification or supplementation, must be accomplished by a formal contract amendment signed and approved by the duly authorized representatives of the City and the Commission.

(28) COMMISSION REPRESENTATIVE: The Commission's **Kansas City District Engineer** is designated as the Commission's representative for the purpose of

administering the provisions of this Agreement. The Commission's representative may designate by written notice other persons having the authority to act on behalf of the Commission in furtherance of the performance of this Agreement.

(29) NOTICES: Any notice or other communication required or permitted to be given hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed given three (3) days after delivery by United States mail, regular mail postage prepaid, or upon receipt by personal or facsimile delivery, addressed as follows:

or to such other place as the parties may designate in accordance with this Agreement. To be valid, facsimile delivery shall be followed by delivery of the original document, or a clear and legible copy thereof, within three (3) business days of the date of facsimile transmission of that document.

(30) NONDISCRIMINATION ASSURANCE: With regard to work under this Agreement, the City agrees as follows:

(A) Civil Rights Statutes: The City shall comply with all state and federal statutes relating to nondiscrimination, including but not limited to Title VI and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended (42 USC §2000d and §2000e, et seq.), as well as any applicable titles of the "Americans with Disabilities Act" (42 USC §12101, et seq.). In addition, if the City is providing services or operating programs on behalf of the Department or the Commission, it shall comply with all applicable provisions of Title II of the "Americans with Disabilities Act".

(B) Administrative Rules: The City shall comply with the administrative rules of the USDOT relative to nondiscrimination in federally assisted programs of the USDOT (49 CFR Part 21) which are herein incorporated by reference and made part of this Agreement.

(C) Nondiscrimination: The City shall not discriminate on grounds of the race, color, religion, sex, disability, national origin, age, or ancestry of any individual in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurement of materials and leases of equipment. The City shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by 49 CFR §21.5, including employment practices.

(D) Solicitations for Subcontracts, Including Procurements of Material and Equipment: These assurances concerning nondiscrimination also apply to subcontractors and suppliers of the City. These apply to all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by the City for work to be performed under a subcontract including procurement of materials or equipment. Each potential subcontractor or supplier shall be notified by the City of the requirements of this Agreement relative to nondiscrimination on grounds of the race, color, religion, sex, disability or national origin, age, or ancestry of any individual.

(E) Information and Reports: The City shall provide all information and reports required by this Agreement, or orders and instructions issued pursuant thereto, and will permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the Commission or the USDOT to be necessary to ascertain compliance with other contracts, orders and instructions. Where any information required of the City is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information, the City shall so certify to the Commission or the USDOT as appropriate and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.

(F) Sanctions for Noncompliance: In the event the City fails to comply with the nondiscrimination provisions of this Agreement, the Commission shall impose such contract sanctions as it or the USDOT may determine to be appropriate, including but not limited to:

1. Withholding of payments under this Agreement until the City complies; and/or
2. Cancellation, termination, or suspension of this Agreement, in whole or in part, or both.

(G) Incorporation of Provisions: The City shall include the provisions of paragraph (30) of this Agreement in every subcontract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempted by the statutes, executive order, administrative rules or instructions issued by the Commission or the USDOT. The City will take such action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as the Commission or the USDOT may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance; provided that in the event the City becomes involved or is threatened with litigation with a subcontractor or supplier as a result of such direction, the City may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

(31) ACCESS TO RECORDS: The City and its contractors must maintain all records relating to this Agreement, including but not limited to invoices, payrolls, etc. These records must be available at no charge to the FHWA and the Commission and/or their designees or representatives during the period of this Agreement and any extension, and for a period of three (3) years after the date on which the City receives reimbursement

of their final invoice from the Commission.

(32) CONFLICT OF INTEREST: The City shall comply with conflict of interest policies identified in 23 CFR 1.33. A conflict of interest occurs when an entity has a financial or personal interest in a federally funded project.

(33) MANDATORY DISCLOSURES: The City shall comply with 2 CFR 200.113 and disclose, in a timely manner, in writing all violations of Federal criminal law involving fraud, bribery, or gratuity violations potentially affecting the Federal award.

53rd Street Rock Island Trail Extension in Raytown, MO.

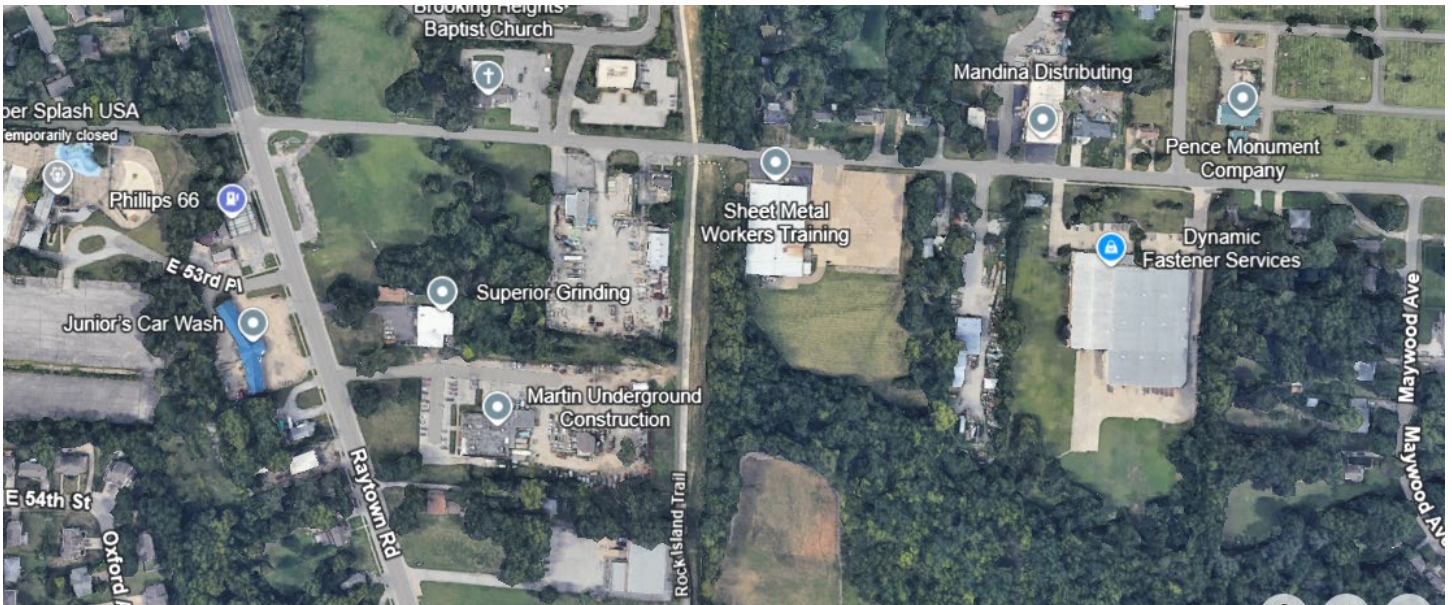

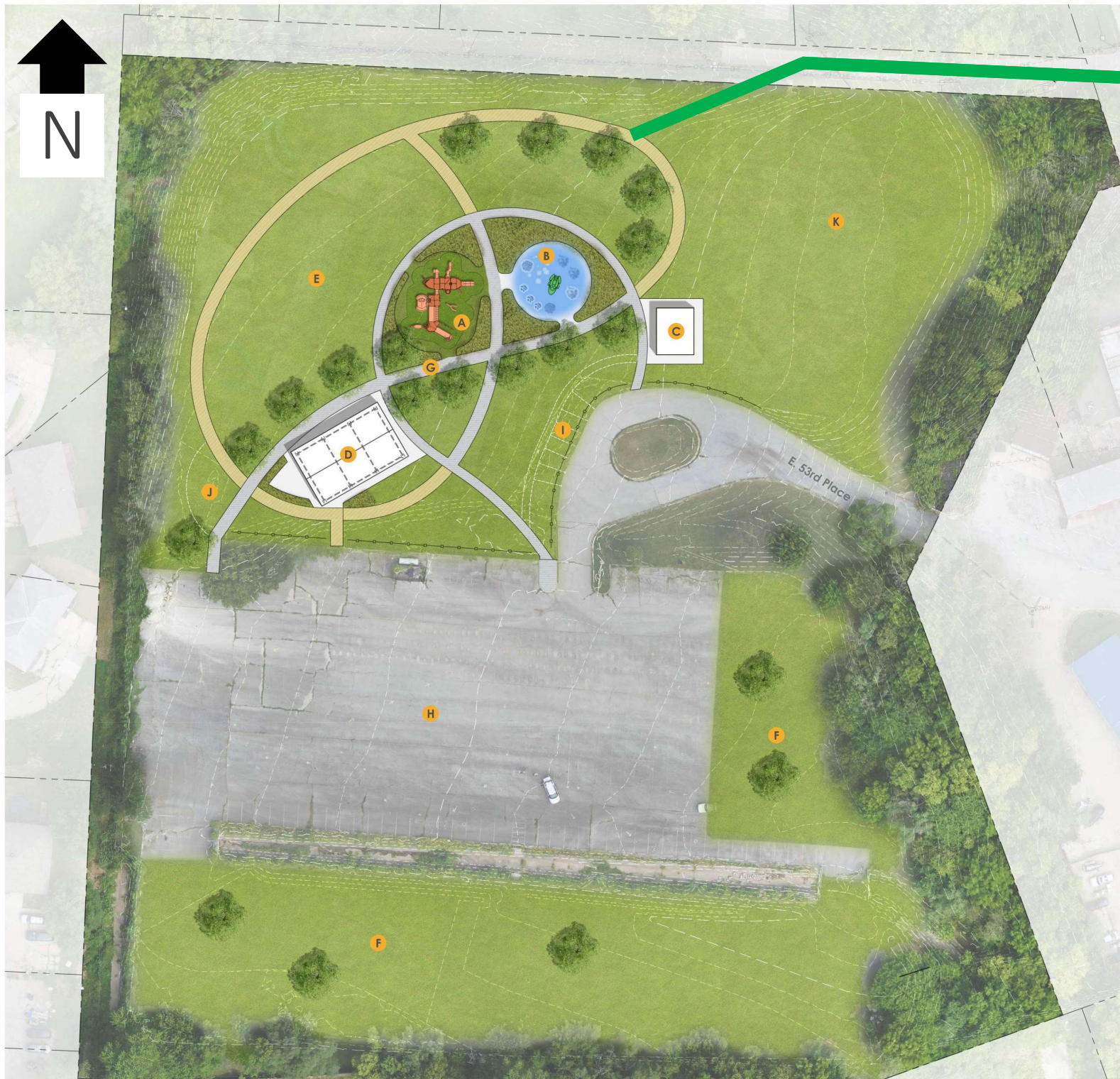

FIRST READING: Bill No. 6694-25, Section IV-A: Authorizing and Approving a Contract for Transit Services with the Kansas City Area Transportation Authority utilizing the IRIS (zTRIP) Transit Service

BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION

A sound, efficient and viable public transportation system is essential to the socio-economic well-being of the Kansas City Area Transportation District, including the Counties of Cass, Clay, Jackson, and Platte in Missouri, and the Counties of Johnson, Leavenworth, and Wyandotte in Kansas. The KCATA is a public agency authorized by law to plan, own, operate, have, and generally deal with public transportation systems and facilities in the District.

The City of Raytown desires to promote the convenience, comfort, prosperity, general interests and welfare of its citizens. KCATA provides the IRIS (zTRIP) Flex Transportation Service to expand access to public transportation to surrounding communities within the Kansas City region, in areas underserved by transit; as well as to create, deploy and operate an innovative mobility system that maximizes transit accessibility through dynamic, on-demand flex transit service. Currently, IRIS is available in Kansas City, MO, Gladstone, Liberty, and Riverside, Missouri.

The IRIS service is an on-demand transportation solution with a service from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m., seven days a week. The service includes para-transit services. The contract is for a fourteen-month agreement with the IRIS (zTrip) program effective beginning July 1, 2025 through August 31, 2026, for \$8,000 monthly. This fee entitles the partner to up to four hundred (400) trips originating within the community during that month. Trips originating in the community beyond the four hundred (400) included in the monthly minimum shall be billed at a rate of \$20.00 per additional trip. At the end of each calendar month, the total number of trips originating in the community shall be calculated. If the number of trips exceeds 400, the community shall be invoiced for the overage based on the \$20.00 per-trip rate. If the total number of trips does not exceed 400, no additional charges shall apply beyond the \$8,000 minimum. During the fourteen-month agreement, trips within the boundaries of the City of Raytown will have a fare of \$0. Trips leaving or coming from borders outside Raytown will follow the IRIS pricing structure within Kansas City, MO, Gladstone, Liberty, and Riverside, Missouri. The KCATA will retain all fare revenues.

WHC (zTrip) contracts with KCATA to provide IRIS transportation services in the Kansas City region. WHC (zTrip) has been servicing the Kansas City region since 1987 with trained, professional and courteous drivers; branded, clean and safe vehicles; with ADA-Compliant operators and vehicles.

The goals of the IRIS (zTrip) service are to expand access to public transportation within KCMO and surrounding communities in areas currently underserved by transit; and to create, deploy and operate an innovative mobility system that maximizes transit accessibility by incorporating dynamic, on-demand flex service to complement traditional transit services. Data will continue to be gathered during the fourteen-month agreement and such data will be used to evaluate the future IRIS (zTrip) service for the City of Raytown, if approved by the Board of Aldermen.

Riders can schedule trips through the "IRIS" App (RideCo, Inc.), which can be downloaded for free on Apple iOS and GooglePlay. The "IRIS" App enables riders to make on-demand and pre-scheduled ride reservations. Riders can pay electronically through the "IRIS" App. Riders not using smartphones can also call a traditional customer service center to schedule an IRIS (zTRip) ride, and arrange payment methods at that time.

Summary IRIS Program:

- Daily on-demand transportation service from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days per week.
- Trips within the boundaries of the City of Raytown will have a fare set by the Raytown Board of Aldermen.
- Trips leaving or coming from borders outside Raytown will follow the IRIS pricing structure within Kansas City; Gladstone; Liberty and Riverside, MO.
- All fare revenues will be retained by KCATA.
- WHC (zTrip) contracts with KCATA to provide IRIS transportation services in the Kansas City region.
- The IRIS (zTrip) on-demand transportation program includes para-transit services.

RECOMMENDED MOTION

Authorize and approve the City Administrator to execute a fourteen-month contract for IRIS (ZTrip) flex transit services by and between KCATA and the City of Raytown, Missouri, for the term of July 1, 2025 to August 31, 2026, in the amount not to exceed \$32,000.00 in FY' 25 and \$80,000 in FY' 26 and establish in the ridership fare for IRIS services in the City of Raytown shall be \$0.00 for the term of the contract.

WHEREAS, the City of Raytown (the "City") is a city of the fourth class, with the authority pursuant to Chapter 70 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Missouri to enter into agreements with other political subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas City Area Transportation Authority ("KCATA") is a body corporate and politic and a political subdivision of the states of Missouri and Kansas with the authority to enter into agreements with other political subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, a sound, efficient and viable public transportation system is essential to the socioeconomic well being of the Kansas City Area Transportation District (hereinafter referred to as the "District"), including the Counties of Cass, Clay, Jackson, and Platte in Missouri, and the Counties of Johnson, Leavenworth, and Wyandotte in Kansas; and

WHEREAS, the KCATA is a public agency authorized by law to plan, own, operate, have and generally deal with public transportation systems and facilities in the District; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to promote the convenience, comfort, prosperity, general interests and welfare of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the goals of IRIS (zTRIP) Flex Transportation Service is to provide expanded access to public transportation to surrounding communities within the Kansas City region, in areas underserved by transit; as well as to create, deploy and operate an innovative mobility system that maximizes transit accessibility through dynamic, on-demand flex transit service; and

WHEREAS, the parties wish to enter into this Contract setting forth the terms and conditions of providing and receiving IRIS (zTRIP) Flex Transportation Service; and

WHEREAS, IRIS (zTRIP) Flex Transportation Service provides a daily demand responsive service from 6 AM to 11 PM. Trips within the boundaries of the City of Raytown will have a fare of \$0. Trips leaving or coming from borders outside of Raytown will follow the IRIS pricing structure within Kansas City, MO and fare revenues will be retained by KCATA; and

WHEREAS, the City of Raytown desires to enter into a Contract for Transit Services by and between the Kansas City Area Transportation Authority and the City of Raytown, Missouri, attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by reference for IRIS (zTRIP) Flex Transportation Service, in an amount not to exceed \$112,00.00.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF RAYTOWN, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1 - APPROVAL OF CONTRACT. That the Contract for Transit Services by and between the Kansas City Area Transportation Authority and the City of Raytown, Missouri, attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by reference for IRIS (zTRIP) Flex Transportation Service, in an amount not to exceed \$112,00.00 is hereby authorized and approved.

SECTION 2 - EXECUTION OF CONTRACT. That the City Administrator is authorized to execute the Contract and all documents necessary to the performance thereof, and the City Clerk is authorized to attest to the same.

SECTION 3 - REPEAL OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4 - SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. The provisions of this ordinance are severable and if any provision hereof is declared invalid, unconstitutional or unenforceable, such determination shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this ordinance.

SECTION 5 - EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and approval.

COMMUNITY TRANSPORTATION SERVICE AGREEMENT

This Contract is entered into this ____ day of _____, 2025, by and between the **KANSAS CITY AREA TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY** (hereinafter referred to as “KCATA”), a body corporate and politic and a political subdivision of both the States of Missouri and Kansas, and **RAYTOWN, MISSOURI**, a Missouri municipality (hereinafter referred to as “Partner”).

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, a sound, efficient and viable public transportation system is essential to the socio-economic wellbeing of the Kansas City Area Transportation District (“**District**”), including the Counties of Cass, Clay, Jackson, and Platte in Missouri, and the Counties of Johnson, Leavenworth, and Wyandotte in Kansas;

WHEREAS, the KCATA is a public agency authorized by law to plan, own, operate, and maintain public transportation systems and services in the district;

WHEREAS, Raytown, Missouri desires to promote the convenience, comfort, prosperity, and general welfare of its residents, employees, constituents, or customers through access to KCATA services;

WHEREAS Raytown requests access to IRIS transportation services operated by KCATA through its third-party service provider WHC (zTRIP) Flex Transportation Service.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the Parties agree as follows:

1. Service Provision

KCATA shall provide IRIS transportation services (hereinafter “Contract Service”) as generally set forth in **Attachment A – Scope of Services**, for the period beginning **July 1, 2025 Date** and ending **August 31, 2026**.

2. Service Adjustments

The level of service as outlined in Attachment A may not be reduced or modified without the mutual consent of both parties. Requests for service increases shall trigger negotiations for revised pricing and contract terms based on current market rates.

3. Payment Terms

Partner agrees to the following cost structure:

a. Monthly Minimum Fee

Partner shall pay a minimum monthly fee of \$8,000. This fee entitles the partner to up to four hundred (400) trips originating within the community during that month.

b. Per-Trip Fee

Trips originating in the community beyond the four hundred (400) included in the monthly minimum shall be billed at a rate of \$20.00 per additional trip.

c. Monthly Billing

At the end of each calendar month, the total number of trips originating in the community shall be calculated. If the number of trips exceeds 400, the community shall be invoiced for the overage based on the \$20.00 per-trip rate. If the total number of trips does not exceed 400, no additional charges shall apply beyond the \$8,000 minimum.

d. Definition of Originating Trip

For purposes of this agreement, a trip shall be considered to "originate" in a community if the initial pickup location falls within the geographical boundaries of that community.

KCATA shall invoice Raytown, Missouri at the beginning of each month for the prior month's service. Payment is due within thirty (30) days.

4. Termination

a. Termination for Convenience:

Either party may terminate this agreement, in whole or in part, with sixty (60) days written notice. KCATA shall be entitled to payment for services rendered up to the date of termination.

b. Termination for Default:

In the event of material non-performance, including failure to deliver services or remit payment, either party may terminate this Contract by providing written notice specifying

the nature of the default. The defaulting party shall have fifteen (15) days to cure the breach before termination becomes effective.

c. Immediate Termination by KCATA:

Notwithstanding the above, KCATA reserves the right to terminate this agreement immediately, with or without cause, upon written notice to the Partner. In such event, KCATA shall be entitled to payment for services performed up to the effective date of termination.

5. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Compliance

As federal funds or resources may be used, the following clauses apply:

- **No Federal Government Obligation to Third Parties**
- **Program Fraud and False Statements** (31 U.S.C. §3801–3812)
- **Civil Rights** (Title VI, EEO, ADA compliance)
- **Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE)** (49 CFR Part 26)
- **Debarment and Suspension** (2 CFR Part 180)
- **Buy America** (where applicable)
- **Lobbying Certification** (Byrd Amendment)

All parties shall comply with federal and state rules and maintain appropriate records subject to audit.

6. Record Retention and Audits

KCATA and Partner shall retain financial and service records for a period of three (3) years following contract expiration or termination. Records shall be made available for audit or inspection by authorized representatives.

7. General Provisions

a. This contract shall benefit and bind the successors and permitted assigns of both parties.

- b. This contract may be executed in counterparts and via electronic means.
- c. This agreement constitutes the entire understanding of the parties and supersedes all prior oral or written agreements.
- d. All modifications shall be made in writing and signed by both parties.
- e. Any provisions which by nature extend beyond termination shall survive.
- f. Any required consents shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.

8. Governing Law

This Contract shall be governed by the laws of the **State of Missouri**, and any legal action shall be brought in the **Circuit Court of Jackson County, Missouri**.

CITY OF RAYTOWN, MISSOURI CONTRACT SERVICE

IRIS will provide daily demand-responsive transportation service from 6:00 AM to 10:00 PM. Trips that originate and terminate within the boundaries of the City of Raytown will be fare-free (\$0). For trips that either begin or end outside the city limits of Raytown, the standard IRIS fare structure applicable within Kansas City, MO will apply. FIRST READING: Bill No. 6695-25, Section IV-A: Annual adoption of Personal Financial Disclosure reporting.

BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION

In 1991, the Missouri General Assembly adopted an ethics and personal financial disclosure law, which applied to all municipalities with an annual operating budget in excess of \$1 million. Under the law, municipalities were allowed to adopt their own simplified personal financial disclosure requirements by ordinance (commonly known as “short form” reporting). The financial disclosure reporting requirements apply to each elected official, the City Administrator (as the Chief Administrative Officer and Chief Purchasing Officer), the Director of Finance (as the Chief Financial Officer), the City Clerk, the full-time General Counsel, the Park Board, and the Parks and Recreation Director.

Each political subdivision desiring to use the “short form” is required to readopt the ordinance authorizing “short form” reporting every two years. However, in order to avoid the significant consequences of the failure to readopt the ordinance the recommended best practice is to adopt the ordinance annually.

The ordinance must be adopted by September 15 and a copy must be provided to the Missouri Ethics Commission.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A PROCEDURE TO DISCLOSE POTENTIAL CONFLICTS OF INTEREST AND SUBSTANTIAL INTERESTS FOR CERTAIN MUNICIPAL OFFICIALS IN THE CITY OF RAYTOWN, MISSOURI

WHEREAS, the proper operation of municipal government requires that public officials and employees be independent, impartial and responsible to the people; that government decisions and policy be made in the proper channels of the governmental structure; that public office not be used for personal gain; and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its government; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of these goals, there is hereby established a procedure for disclosure by certain officials and employees of private financial or other interests in matters affecting the City; and

WHEREAS, State law requires that the procedure for disclosure of such interests be adopted by each public subdivision every two years and that a copy of the ordinance be provided to the Missouri Ethics Commission on or before September 15; and

WHEREAS, the City of Raytown has determined it is in the best interest of the citizens of the City to reaffirm its commitment to disclose such interests and adopt such procedures annually;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF RAYTOWN, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1 – RE-ADOPTION OF CITY CODE SECTION 2-262. That Chapter 2, Administration, Article III, Officers and Employees, Division 6, Ethical Standards, Section 2-262, Disclosure reports, of the City Code is hereby adopted to read as follows:

Sec. 2-262. Disclosure reports.

Each elected official, the City Administrator (as the Chief Administrative Officer and Purchasing Officer), the Director of Finance (as the Chief Financial Officer), the City Clerk, the full-time General Counsel, the Park Board, and the Parks and Recreation Director, shall disclose the following information by May 1 if any such transactions occurred during the previous calendar year:

- (1) For such person, and all persons within the first degree of consanguinity or affinity of such person, the date and the identities of the parties to each transaction with a total value in the excess of five hundred dollars (\$500.00), if any, that such person had with the political subdivision, other than compensation received as an employee or payment of any tax, fee or penalty due to the political subdivision, and other than transfers for no consideration to the political subdivision.
- (2) The date and the identities of the parties to each transaction known to the person with a total value in excess of five hundred dollars (\$500.00), if any, that any business entity in which such person had a substantial interest, had with the political subdivision, other than payment of any tax, fee or penalty due to the political subdivision or transactions involving payment for providing utility service to the political subdivision, and other than transfers for no consideration to the political subdivision.

- (3) The City Administrator (as Chief Administrative Officer and Chief Purchasing Officer) shall also disclose by May 1 for the previous calendar year the following information:
- a. The name and address of each of the employers of such person from whom income of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or more was received during the year covered by the statement.
 - b. The name and address of each sole proprietorship that he owned; the name, address and the general nature of the business conducted of each general partnership and joint venture in which he was a partner or participant; the name and address of each partner or co-participant for each partnership or joint venture unless such names and addresses are filed by the partnership or joint venture with the secretary of state; the name, address and general nature of the business conducted of any closely held corporation or limited partnership in which the person owned ten (10) per cent or more of any class of the outstanding stock or limited partnership units; and the name of any publicly traded corporation or limited partnership that is listed on a regulated stock exchange or automated quotation system in which the person owned two (2) percent or more of any class of outstanding stock, limited partnership units or other equity interests.
 - c. The name and address of each corporation for which such person served in the capacity of a director, officer or receiver.

SECTION 2 – RE-ADOPTION OF CITY CODE SECTION 2-263. That Chapter 2, Administration, Article III, Officers and Employees, Division 6, Ethical Standards, Section 2-263, Filing of disclosure reports, of the City Code is hereby adopted to read as follows:

Sec. 2-263. Filing of disclosure reports.

The disclosure report shall be filed at the following times, but no person is required to file more than one (1) report in any calendar year:

- (1) Each person appointed to office who is required to report under section 2-262 shall file the report within thirty (30) days of such appointment or employment.
- (2) Every other person required to file a report shall file the same annually no later than May 1 and the report shall cover the calendar year ending the immediately preceding December 31; provided that any member of the Board of Aldermen may supplement the report to disclose additional interests acquired after December 31 of the covered year until the date of filing the report.
- (3) The reports shall be filed with the City Clerk and the Ethics Commission. The reports shall be available for public inspection and copying during normal business hours.

SECTION 3 – CITY CLERK TO NOTIFY MISSOURI ETHICS COMMISSION. The City Clerk is hereby directed to provide a copy of this ordinance to the Missouri Ethics Commission on or before September 15, 2025.

SECTION 4 – REPEAL OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5 – EFFECTIVE DATE. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and approval.
